TransLink brings new 24-hour service to YVR

Early morning flight? Late-night red-eye commute? Getting to and from Vancouver International Airport (YVR) just became a lot easier.

At the start of 2026, TransLink officially expanded service on the N10 NightBus, creating 24-hour, seven-day-a-week public transit

access to YVR.

The expanded service fills the gap when the Canada Line is closed overnight from approximately 1:00 a.m. to 5:00 a.m.—providing a reliable new option for those travelling during early-morning and late-night hours.

For YVR, this is a major step forward in improving accessibility. With several flights operating well outside regular transit hours, the N10 helps ensure travellers have numerous ways to access the airport at all hours of the day.

Providing service between Downtown Vancouver and Richmond City Centre, the N10

operates along Granville Street in Vancouver, and No. 3 Road in Richmond, crossing the Arthur Laing Bridge to connect directly to the airport. This TransLink route offers travellers bound for Vancouver or Richmond a convenient new way to reach their destination.

At YVR, the bus stops in the Domestic Departures area on Level 3, providing a convenient and well-lit pick-up and drop-off point close to the terminal.

The overnight service runs every 30-32 minutes, seven days a week, providing consistent, dependable connections for trav-

Air Canada's new Vancouver-Sapporo service bolsters YVR's role as a major Trans-Pacific hub



Air Canada will launch new non-stop service from Vancouver International Airport (YVR) to Sapporo-Chitose (CTS) in December 2026, providing direct access to Japan's Hokkaido prefecture—home to world-class winter sports, the Sapporo Snow Festival, natural hot springs, and celebrated regional cuisine.

"As Canada's Pacific gateway to Asia, YVR is ready to welcome Air Canada's new direct service to Sapporo, Japan," said Tamara Vrooman, President and CEO of Vancouver International Airport. "This new route builds on YVR's strategy as a key Trans-Pacific hub, further strengthening the deep trade, economic, and cul-

ing year-round routes to Tokyo-Narita and Tokyo-Haneda, as well as its summer seasonal service to Osaka-Kansai.

Air Canada includes ski bags and equipment in its standard checked baggage allowance for international flights to Hokkaido's ski regions.

tural ties between Canada and Japan, and providing additional travel and cargo options to both countries and beyond."

The new service expands Air Canada's international network and positions the airline as the carrier with the most non-stop destinations from the North American mainland to Japan.

Flights will operate three times weekly from December 2026 through March 2027 aboard Air Canada's Boeing 787 Dreamliner, offering Signature Class, Premium Economy, and Economy cabins.

The airline's new winter service to Sapporo complements its exist-

March 31 is Canada's National Indigenous Languages Day. This day recognizes past attempts to eradicate and outlaw languages spoken by First Nations, Métis, and Inuit Peoples and instead celebrates the important work being done across Canada to preserve and honour Indigenous language and culture.

The United Nations declared 2022-2032 as the International Decade of Indigenous Languages. In a recent session with Zoe Kompst, Vancouver International Airport's (YVR) Indigenous Communications and Community Liaison, she commented on the importance of Indigenous Languages Day: "As I move across the airport, I am mindful when I listen to the many languages spoken by those around me ... by

friends and families sharing a small piece of their culture with one another—they are also preserving their cultural identities."

"For me," said Zoe, "our hənqəmīnəm language is at the heart of who we are as Musqueam people—when I hear words and stories passed down through generations, I feel more connected to the ancestors, to my community, and to future generations who will one day hear these same words."

"Indigenous Languages Day is important to me because Musqueam only has one fluent speaker left. We have a whole team of people listening to tapes of elders, now passed, and poring over old hand-written notes in an effort to recover and preserve their words—and their teachings."

On this day, YVR honours past and present language speakers, for sharing their teachings and encouraging learners to join them as we walk forward together in this time of learning.

Verified Traveller Lane at Checkpoint 3 moves to Domestic North

On January 22, the Verified Traveller Lane at Checkpoint 3 was permanently relocated to the Domestic North security point at Vancouver International Airport (YVR).

This dedicated lane serves NEXUS (a joint Canada-U.S. program for low-risk travellers that offers expedited border crossings), RAIC (a Transport Canada-issued pass for individuals needing access to secure airport areas), Global Entry cardholders (an RFID-enabled ID for pre-approved, low-risk travellers), and military or police personnel.

Since 2024, YVR has invested

in new equipment and upgrades across its Domestic security screening checkpoints, making them more efficient and improving the traveller experience.

As part of these upgrades to the Domestic security checkpoints, Verified travellers will now use the Domestic North checkpoint.

Checkpoint 3 is now closed to front-of-house travellers and will revert to serving only non-One-Stop-Screening (OSS) connecting passengers.

YVR's enhanced Domestic security checkpoints ensure that every journey through the airport is not only secure but also welcoming,

effortless, and uniquely reflective of the community.

Other security checkpoints—for U.S. and International departures—will undergo similar

upgrades later this year.

Signage and additional staffing will be in place throughout the terminal to ensure a smooth experience.

Notable Canadian aviation firsts

- First aircraft to fly in Canada (and the British Empire)**—The Silver Dart, flown by J.A.D. McCurdy on February 23, 1909, in Baddeck, Nova Scotia. This was the first powered, controlled flight anywhere in the Commonwealth.
- World's first scheduled airmail flight**—On June 24, 1918, Captain Brian Peck flew the first regular airmail delivery between Montreal and Toronto—a global first for scheduled service.
- First helicopter to fly in Canada**—The Sikorsky VS-300, demonstrated in 1943, marked

Canada's entry into rotary-wing aviation.

World's first jet transport aircraft with a pressurized cabin

The Avro Jetliner (1949) was the second jet airliner to fly in the world—just 13 days after the de Havilland Comet—and the first with a pressurized cabin.

First aircraft to break the sound barrier in level flight in Canada

The CF-100 Canuck reached this milestone in the early 1950s, placing Canada among the few nations to field a domestically designed, supersonic-capable aircraft.

YVR beyond the terminal: Team YVR sleeps out for youth



Since 2024, Vancouver International Airport (YVR) employees have been stepping well outside their comfort zones by taking part in the annual Covenant House Vancouver Sleep Out, raising nearly \$30,000 to help ensure vulnerable youth have a safe place to sleep.

Sleep Out asks individuals and teams to raise funds and to give up their beds for one night—sleeping outside in solidarity with young people experiencing homelessness. The experience offers a firsthand look at the realities many youths face, and a deeper understanding of the wrap-around support Covenant House Vancouver provides.

For many participants, the decision to take part is rooted in connection. As one YVR employee shared, "Hearing Covenant House's



success stories in person during a previous volunteer opportunity made it an easy yes. I wanted to help shine some light on their work."

The experience itself can be challenging in unexpected ways. Another participant reflected, "The hardest part is knowing I have the option to go home at any

time... and recognizing that this isn't the case for anyone experiencing homelessness."

This year's Sleep Out: Champions Edition shines a spotlight on mental health, a critical and often overlooked need for young people facing trauma and uncertainty. Funds raised will

directly support Covenant House Vancouver's mental health programming, helping young people heal and move forward.

On February 19, YVR is proud to once again join Covenant House Vancouver as the corporate match partner, contributing \$50,000 to multiply the impact of every dol-

lar raised.

Through the Sleep Out experience, Team YVR hopes to raise awareness and help ensure young people not only have a safe place to sleep but also the chance to dream about what comes next.

A smoother journey ahead: Security screening equipment upgrade in YVR's Domestic terminal

At Vancouver International Airport (YVR), there is always a focus on making the airport journey smoother and faster. That's why YVR is partnering with the Canadian Air Transport Security Authority (CATSA) to modernize its screening checkpoints with new CATSA Plus Computed Tomography (CT) X-ray equipment.

This equipment upgrade—now complete at two of YVR's Domestic security checkpoints—allows travellers to move through screening without removing liquids, aerosols, gels, or large elec-

tronics from their carry-on bags.

The new CT technology enhances both safety and efficiency, helping more passengers move seamlessly through screening while continuing to enjoy YVR's signature mix of local art and West Coast storytelling.

As the first airport in Canada to adopt the new CATSA Plus equipment in September 2024, YVR is helping set a new standard for airport security.

Building on this momentum, YVR will extend this technology to every checkpoint across the terminal in 2026, including

With new CATSA Plus CT X-ray scanners at YVR's Domestic terminal, screening officers can view detailed images of carry-on bag contents—meaning fewer items for passengers to unpack or repack.

International and U.S. departure screenings.

This upgrade reflects YVR's ongoing commitment to innovation and growth, ensuring that every journey through the airport is not only secure but also welcoming, effortless, and uniquely reflective of the community.

Andrea Stuart, General Manager for Vancouver at Hudson by Avolta explains what makes the shop special.

What guides your approach to product selection?

"Our priority is to create an authentic sense of place for travellers. We want guests to leave with something that feels uniquely Vancouver, British Columbia or Canada. To achieve this, we focus on curating items from local small and medium-sized businesses and artisans.

"For example, we feature apparel from Vancity Apparel and Ole Originals—both based in B.C.—along with candles and diffusers from Ollie & Co, tea from Paragon, glassware inspired by the mountains from MTNPK and puzzles from Villager Puzzles that double as art for the home and support Canadian female artists.

"The goal is to offer high-quality, locally inspired products that give travellers a meaningful connection to the region while fitting the convenience and time-sensitive nature of an airport shopping experience."

What have been your most popular items so far?

"We're still early in our sales journey, so customer favourites are evolving daily. One partnership I'm particularly proud of is with Dank Mart. Through them, we've introduced a selection of novelty, international and trending candies, which have been a big hit with travellers looking for something fun and unique.

"Another standout is Six Hats Supply Co. Their hats have performed really well, and what makes them special is the feel-good component—every hat purchased helps provide six people



with clean drinking water."

How do you incorporate sustainability into your business model?

"Sustainability was a major focus when we designed Alpine Loft. We challenged ourselves to make as many choices as possible that reduce waste and highlight responsible materials.

"For example, our hangers and sign holders are made of wood, and we've eliminated acrylic wherever possible. Even our staff tools reflect this commitment—binders are cardboard, pens are made from cornstarch and cardboard, and our stapler and tape dispensers are bamboo. We also partnered with ChopValue—a Vancouver-based company that recycles used chopsticks into high-quality, durable wood products—to incorporate recycled elements, including bins for paper items like receipts.

"For sizing, we moved away from the typical plastic dividers and created wooden ones with hand-burned designs for a unique, eco-friendly touch. On the prod-



uct side, we're proud to feature vendors like Billy Would, who repurposes reclaimed skate decks into jewellery, belt buckles and keychains.

"These details may seem small,

but together they create a space that feels authentic, thoughtful and aligned with our sustainability goals."

brands, Hudson Group has created a space that feels modern, meaningful and connected to Vancouver.



Air France commemorates 50th anniversary of Concorde's first commercial flight

On Wednesday, January 21, 1976, at 12:40 p.m., Air France launched its first commercial Concorde service to Dakar and Rio de Janeiro. After a swift 7 hours and 26 minutes in the air, the airline officially entered its supersonic era—an era that would span 27 years, ending in 2003. Cruising at roughly 18,288 metres, nearly twice the altitude of conventional long-haul aircraft, passengers could gaze out and see the gentle curve of the Earth along the horizon.

By comparison, the same route flown in 1976 by other commercial aircraft took roughly 12 hours.

With a seat capacity of 100, the Concorde reached a cruising speed of Mach 2.02, or 2,173 km per hour. Its sleek, unique, and instantly recognizable silhouette featured a wingspan of 26 metres, a length of 62 metres, and a height of 11 metres.

A genuine technological showcase and masterpiece of innovation, the Concorde is a legendary aircraft that has left a lasting technological and cultural imprint. A symbol of Franco-British expertise, it remains a primary reference point for Air France's identity—an endless source of inspiration that shapes innovation and the contemporary customer experience.

From its inaugural flight in 1976, the Concorde stood out for its excellence. The service reflected the ambitions of

the supersonic, with champagne and fresh Périgord truffle pastries by Lenôtre, a classic choice. On board, every detail counted toward delivering a luxury travel experience. The narrow cabin was an ultra-modern reminder of the golden age of prestige aviation.

Air France initially worked with French industrial designer Raymond Loewy, in charge of fitting out the first version of the supersonic jet, including the décor for the lounge at Paris-Charles de Gaulle with furniture designed by Le Corbusier, the cabin interior featuring seats in various colours, lighting, pristine, sleek tableware, and a meal tray.

In 1985, and again in 1988, Pierre Gautier-Delaye created two distinct cabin interior styles: the first featuring a livery of tulip red, blue, and beige, and the second a décor of yellow and grey shades.

In 1994, Andrée Putman gave the Concorde interior a contemporary update, bringing it into the modern era. The White Bird remained more than ever the emblem of luxury in the sky. The "goddess" of design unveiled her new interior, inspired by the idea of adding headrest covers and a carpet with a black-and-white geometric pattern. She also redesigned the meal tray to resemble a small, delicately pleated corrugated cardboard box. The result was an elegantly designed white

porcelain service with a delicate blue border, comprising a range of tableware items from appetizer dishes to a coffee set.

To celebrate the new era of supersonic travel, fashion designer Jean Patou and his artistic director, Angelo Tarlazzi, designed a uniform exclusively for Concorde flight attendants. The blouse dress, patterned with navy blue and beige stripes, displayed alternating colours to create an optical effect evocative of the airline's logo.

In 1985, to celebrate Concorde's tenth anniversary, Nina Ricci designed a new uniform: slate blue, navy blue, or pearl grey crepe dresses to stand out against the new aircraft décor by Pierre Gautier-Delaye. These classic dresses were enhanced by a scarf worn around the neck or as a belt.

To commemorate the 50th anniversary of Concorde's inaugural flight, Air France has launched an anniversary collection that pays tribute to this icon of French aviation and to the pioneering vision that marked an entire era. Model aircraft, silk scarves, shawls, notebooks, and keyrings are among the exclusive items, some of which are limited editions.

New race for supersonic flight

After two decades of supersonic silence in the skies, a new generation of aerospace innovators is accelerating efforts return supersonic travel to commercial aviation.

Companies from the U.S. to Europe and Australia are pushing the limits of aerodynamics, propulsion and low-boom design as they work to build a viable passenger aircraft capable of breaking the sound barrier.

With demonstrator aircraft flying and production lines taking shape, the supersonic revival has throttled forward from futuristic ambition to a rapidly approaching reality.

The following are companies actively pursuing civilian or busi-

ness-jet supersonic projects:

Boom Supersonic

Developing the Overture airliner and the XB-1 demonstrator, Boom is the most advanced and well-funded commercial program, with airline interest from commercial airlines such as United, American, and Japan Airlines.

Exosonic

A U.S. startup designing low-boom supersonic business jets and government transport concepts. Listed among leading supersonic/hypersonic innovators.

Destinus

A European company developing hydrogen-powered supersonic and hypersonic aircraft, with commercial long-range applications.

Hermes

Focused on hybrid supersonic-hypersonic propulsion with potential commercial applications, though early-stage. Included among the top global high-speed aerospace developers.

Hypersonix Launch Systems

An Australian company that is working on reusable high-speed aircraft with potential future commercial roles.

Among all commercial supersonic developers, the company closest to completing a flyable, certifiable aircraft is Boom Supersonic, which has achieved

multiple concrete milestones that no other commercial supersonic developer has matched:

- **Successful supersonic flight of its demonstrator (XB-1):**

Boom's XB-1 became the first civil supersonic jet built in the U.S. to break the sound barrier, completing a Mach 1.22 (12.2 per cent faster than the speed of sound, but less than Concorde's Mach 2.02 cruise speed) test flight in January 2025.

- **Completion of its Overture Superfactory:** In June 2024, Boom finished building the first

dedicated supersonic airliner factory in the United States, designed to produce up to 33 Overture aircraft per year.

- **Regulatory progress enabling future operations:** The U.S. reversed its 50-year ban on supersonic flight over land in 2025, removing a significant barrier for Boom's business model.

Additionally, according to recent reports, Boom is further along in hardware development, with engine components already in testing and a full-scale engine core nearing completion.



WestJet reverses densified seating plan, following passenger feedback

WestJet is rolling back part of its recent densified cabin configuration after operational data and passenger feedback showed the new layout wasn't meeting guest expectations.

The densified design, installed on a portion of the airline's Boeing 737 fleet, reduced economy seat pitch to 28 inches—noticeably tighter than the typical 30-31 inches offered across North America.

The airline paused further reconfigurations in December and had planned to complete its eval-


uation by mid-February. However, in response to customer concerns, WestJet accelerated its review and has now committed to restoring the previous standard seat pitch. Aircraft that had been reconfigured to 180 seats will return to 174 seats.

CEO Alexis von Hoensbroeck said the airline's willingness to test new products stems from its entrepreneurial roots but emphasized the importance of responding quickly when changes do not align with guest needs.

Reversing the densification

requires engineering certification and a phased implementation process. Once certified, WestJet will begin converting all affected aircraft back to the 174-seat layout, with timelines still to be finalized.

While seat pitch is being restored, WestJet continues to evaluate other elements of the new cabin design. Broader investments—including refreshed interiors, upgraded amenities, and modernized styling—remain part of the airline's long-term plan to enhance the overall guest experience.



Canada's new Search-and-Rescue workhorse: CC-295 Kingfisher



On January 21, 2026, Canadian Forces Base 14 Wing Greenwood in Nova Scotia welcomed its first CC-295 Kingfisher fixed-wing search-and-rescue (SAR) aircraft to the East Coast, advancing the Royal Canadian Air Force's (RCAF) long-awaited modernization of its SAR capability.

In 2016, the Canadian

Government signed a contract to purchase 16 CC-195 Kingfisher aircraft to replace six CC-115 Buffalo and 10 CC-130H Hercules (SAR-configured) aircraft, which could no longer effectively perform modern search-and-rescue tasks across Canada's vast and challenging geography.

The delivery of the first CC-295

was marked in September 2020, when the RCAF announced its arrival at CFB 19 Wing Comox in British Columbia, where it remained for aircrew training and operational testing.

Its first operational rescue in Canada to assist a downed pilot occurred in the mountains of north-eastern BC near Mount Kinney in May 2025, three weeks after entering service, proving that the new SAR platform could operate in rugged, remote Canadian terrain.

Electronic Travel Authorization now mandatory for UK entry

As of January 2026, Canadian citizens travelling to or transiting through the United Kingdom must obtain a UK Electronic Travel Authorization (ETA).

This mandatory digital pre-travel clearance applies to all visa-exempt visitors and has been required for Canadians since January 8, 2025.

Key Details for Canadians

- Requirement: Mandatory for tourism, visiting family or friends, business trips, and short-term study
- Cost: £16 (approximately C\$30) per applicant
- Validity—valid for two years and allows multiple entries, provided the passport used for the application remains valid
- Processing Time: Most applications are approved within minutes, but travellers are advised to apply at least three business days before departure.
- How to Apply
 - Fastest: UK ETA app
 - Online: Official UK government website (GOV.UK)
- What You Need
 - A valid passport
 - An email address
 - A credit/debit card or Apple Pay/Google Pay
- Transit: An ETA is required if you pass through UK border control, such as when changing airports or leaving the airport during a layover.
- Not a Visa: An ETA authorizes travel to the UK but does not guarantee entry. Border officers make the final decision upon arrival.



- Beware of Scams: Apply only through the official UK ETA app or the UK government website (gov.uk/eta) to avoid fraudulent third-party sites charging unnecessary fees.
- Always verify the latest information on the official UK government website (gov.uk/eta) before booking or travelling, as entry requirements can change.






